This year was our first time hosting an event called "A Haunting in the Hamlet." This was the brainchild of Marion Historic Association President, Jennifer Hunter. The membership, with the help of the 4H groups, created an event that was well received by the community. Time staggered groups were lead on a walk down Main St. to the cemetery lane on N. Main. They then proceeded to through the cemetery, back out on Buffalo St. and up to the museum for refreshments. 

Seymour donated many of the monuments in the main cemetery including the entry gate on Cemetery Lane, the Soldier's Monument, the Helen Green Memorial Chapel and the angel statue and vault near the Seymour/Green lot. Her donations were in memory of her family, principally Eli and Margaret Green who were her grandparents. Eli was a Revolutionary War veteran. Her donation of the Soldier's Monument to honor him made the news in papers throughout the country well into the Midwest. Other subjects included Friend and George Kenyon, a father/son set of Civil War veterans. Because some of our 4H group members also do Civil War re-enactment, they already had costumes appropriate to the period which really enhanced



the experience for those who paid for the tour.








We had about 40 people take part in our first tour. Thanks to Mark Haskins for allowing us to open the vault in the Marion Cemetery.



WHAT'S NEW AT THE MUSEUM?



Much work has been done at the museum. Thanks to Jon and Jen Hunter and family for sanding and sealing the floors. Jen's mother and father, Doug and Karen Knapp, were instrumental in the refinishing of the fireplace. The fireplace had been stripped years ago and parts made by Gordon Van Hall to replace the damaged sections, but had never been stained and sealed. John Bovet helped with painting and scraping trim around windows and doors. In addition to that work, Karen Knapp stripped the paint off the tile of the fireplace. As a result of their work, we were able to show the beginnings of what the museum will look like as the displays start to come together over the winter. It was great to have this available for the open house we had before the parade on December 18.

The setback cupboard in the dining room is from the family of Dr. Allen Steele Russell. We recently installed a Pomeroy Foundation marker in front of his old home. The dining room chairs are from the Order of the Eastern Star from the former Masonic Lodge in Marion. The dining room light was donated by an antique dealer from Palmyra. The light fixture in the living room is identical to one that appears in a photo from the 1900's of the living room. It was found in a barn sale in East Palmyra. We hope to begin work on the kitchen over the winter.

HOFFMAN GRANT AWARDED

The Marion Historic Association is the proud recipient of a Hoffman Foundation grant. We applied for one to help with the publication costs of the new book "The Train That Stopped for Traffic Light." We received \$400 towards this purpose. Some of you may remember writing a Hoffman paper as seniors in high school. These papers are still utilized by the Wayne County Historian's office and local historians for their insights on local history and personal recollections of local events. The Hoffman Clock Museum is located in a wing in the Newark Library and is also funded by the Hoffman Foundation. The clock museum showcases the collections of Augustus and Jennie Hoffman and opened in 1954. The Hoffman's established their foundation to preserve their collections. The museum has a wonderful collection of clocks, as well as lusterware, porcelain and glassware. Take time to stop in to see it!

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know the First National Bank of Marion had it's own currency? Recently, Dr. Barry Thorne and family donated a \$10 bill dated 1929. The First National Bank of Marion was chartered in 1914. It holds the distinction of being one of the few banks in the country that did not shut down for several days after the market crash in 1929. This bank issued notes dated 1902 (\$10 and \$20 denominations) and 1929 (\$10 and \$20 denominations). Bank notes were printed from 1914 to 1935. During this time, national currency in the amount of \$284,320 was printed.

On June 1, 1974, this bank continued operations as Central Trust Company. Later it was purchased by M and T Bank. In the last few years, it has been open only as an ATM location. We are pleased to have this bank note to add to our future display on the First National Bank of Marion, New York. The charter for the First National Bank is still active under the umbrella of the M and T Bank. It has assets of over \$10 million dollars.
