WHAT'S NEW AT THE MUSEUM?

WORK, WORK, WORK!

It's been a productive few months at the museum. We have had the benefit of an intern, Sam Harding, who came to us as a result of a program through the State University of New York at Geneseo. This program was recently expanded by a grant from the Gardiner Foundation and, through it, Sam gets paid to come out to work for the Marion Historic Association for 150 hours this summer. The association is also paid \$500 to sponsor Sam.

I can only tell you Sam has been a Godsend. He is from Massachusetts and comes from a family with extensive experience in museums and what that involves. He has been working with me all summer doing everything from cataloguing items, painting primer on drywall and moving materials around the building. Sam's end goal is to be a history teacher and he will also be working remotely for part of his time to build a Marion page on the ConsidertheSourceNY.org website established by the State Department of Education. I have enjoyed having his perspective on things as well as his enthusiasm and "can do" outlook.

FROM THE HISTORIAN'S DESK:

I recently gave a presentation of my program "The Newark and Marion Railway" to the Newark-Arcadia Historical Society. It was very well attended. I spoke with a man who showed me a photo postcard of the train with an inscription on the back stating that this was the train the author had arrived in Marion on. It was sent to family in Belgium and had made its way back to the US. It was a touching moment as I thought what that postcard (and train) represented to that family; a new life and an opportunity to escape the hardships of Europe at that time after the war.

WALT MCKENNA'S BARBERSHOP BENCH

We got a call recently from Steve Schutt saying this bench was going up for auction locally and we jumped on the opportunity. The Ron McKenna Family came through and sponsored the purchase of this bench which is now on the front porch of the museum. How many of you have sat on this bench waiting for a haircut? What stories could it tell. We are grateful for the continued support of the

McKenna family.



Walt McKenna was a barber in Marion for 65 years. He arrived in Marion from Rochester in 1904 and initially worked in the barber shop of Edward Snyder, located in the Clark Block, which used to be located next to the bank

In 1979, his widow, Jennie, donated Walt's traveling barber kit to the Marion Historic Association. It includes two razors, leather strop, honing stone, scissors, black and white polka dotted cape, and sleeve garters as well as a tool used to achieve the iconic flat top. Also donated were two cups used at the barber shop.

It was said one could set their clock by Walt walking to and from work. He retired at 81 years of age.

HISTORY SPOTLIGHT: THE WAKE - LAKEY COBBLESTONE



THE BICENTENNIAL QUILT POSTER IS HERE!

The quilt was recently completed by the Reverse Curves Quilt club and is on display at local venues this year. The photos were all taken by Robert Mogray. The "Believed to have been built under the supervision of Henry Butler of Palmyra, NY, it was once the home of Capt. Ira Lakey, who made two voyages around the world in a whaling vessel as its Captain. After his retirement he owned this house from 1850-1860. Later a Mr. Covey sold it to Mr. Wake Sr. who was born in Dunnington, England, Nov. 1771. He came to America on a sailing vessel with his wife and nine children in 1831, down the St. Lawrence River, landing at Pultneyville. He settled not far from Ridge Chapel, where he and his family attended church and many lie buried in the Ridge Chapel cemetery.

Mr. Wake had two windows lowered in the living room to please his daughter, Flora (now Mrs. Jared Nasmith) who thought the room too dark. Mr. Wake had a great variety of fruit trees on this farm, apples early and late pears and peaches." **information from Mrs. H.T. Jeffery, Historian, William Prescott Chapter, D.A.R. Newark, NY 1940



THE CLARK BLOCK AND BAPTIST CHURCH C. 1880's

This stereoscope view of North Main St. shows the Clark Block, Turk's Store and the Baptist Church. This was recently donated by Stephen Collward. Turk's Store was a source for "spirits" in addition to groceries since Marion had gone dry at this point. He was arrested several times for selling but it didn't seem to deter him. The Baptist Church was demolished and a new one constructed of brick after this picture was taken. The Clark Block had many businesses in it, including a jeweler, barber shop, lawyer and pharmacist at one time.
